| Description | | The Australian White Ibis measures between 65-75cm. It has bare black skin on its head, neck and legs and a long down-curved bill. The rest of its plumage is white, apart from some black plumes above the tail. |
| Habitat | | Likes to be near both fresh and tidal wetlands as well as in farm pasture. |
| What it feeds on | | Crustaceans and other small aquatic animals. |
| Where it feeds | | In shallow water and damp land. |
| Breeding | | Breeding can take place between June-November. 2-5 eggs are laid and reared by both birds. These birds breed in large, closely packed colonies often with herons, spoonbills and egrets. Booragoon Lake is a breeding spot in metropolitan Perth. |
| Did you know? | | Australian white ibis feed by stirring shallow water with their bills open and then eating the small aquatic animals they find. |
